School District Open Enrollment

Wisconsin's inter-district public school Open Enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend school districts other than the one in which they live. Applications may be submitted to no more than three non-resident school districts.

Students in 4K through grade 12 may apply to participate in Open Enrollment. Parents should call their resident school districts to find out if their preschool-aged children qualify for Open Enrollment.

The Open Enrollment application period for the 2024-25 school year is from February 5 - April 30, 2024 until 4:00 p.m. Parents must apply to the non-resident district. A non-resident district is defined as the district in which you do not live, but where you want your child to attend.

It is recommended that you apply for Open Enrollment through the on-line application process at <u>http://dpi.wi.gov/oe.</u> The Open Enrollment application period closes at 4:00 p.m. on April 30, 2024. Late applications will not be accepted for any reason.

Additional Social-Emotional Learning

During the month of March, our social emotional curriculum, Second Step, will focus on having fun with friends.

- Inviting to play Your child is learning how to invite others to play. For example, using a friendly voice and asking, "Do you want to play with me?" Part of this will involve using story cards to notice when other children are not playing with someone and inviting them to play. This helps everyone feel included!
- Joining in with play Your child is also learning how to join play with others. They are learning steps, such as asking to play, giving ideas for play to help them join in, and asking questions.

Creative Curriculum Interest Area: Cooking

This month's *Creative Curriculum* interest area is cooking. When children help adults with cooking, they have an opportunity to learn about nutrition, to be creative, and to prepare their own healthy snacks. Cooking teaches a lot of academic skills, as well. When children learn to follow recipe cards, they develop skills they need to read and write. They are also beginning to experience math concepts by measuring 1 cup of flour and pouring ¼ teaspoon of lemon juice into the batter. Whipping egg whites into meringue and melting cheese are lessons in science.

When children cook, we talk a lot about what they are doing and why. They are scientists, observing what happens to flour when we add water to it, and predicting how high we should fill a muffin tin, so the batter doesn't overflow.

Cooking is one of the few activities that children get to do that is also done by adults. Children pretend to be grown-ups by making meals in their dramatic play. They can also read books and sing songs about food. But when actually preparing food, children can behave as grown-ups.

What You Can Do At Home

Since cooking is already a part of your home life, consider involving your child. Including your child may take extra time, and there may be more of a mess than if you cooked alone, but there are many rewards. Your child will be learning literacy, math, and science skills just by helping you. In addition, cooking sets the stage for lifelong healthy eating habits. When children help prepare their meals, they tend to eat better.

Start your child on simple tasks like stirring batter, squeezing lemons, adding spices, or shaping meatballs. Discuss what you are doing together while cooking. Ask questions like these:

- What happened to the butter when we put it in the microwave?
- How should we get the flour into this cup?
- Did we get all of the juice out of that lemon? Let's push down on the lemon together and see what happens.

The beauty of cooking with children is that they learn skills and have fun at the same time you are attending to a household chore. What could be better than that?!

Cold and Flu Season Continues...

We recommend <u>a student stay home</u> if they have any of these below signs/symptoms:

- Fever (100 degrees or higher)
- Vomiting or diarrhea
- Headache severe enough to interfere with learning
- Cough causing difficulty breathing, chest pain or enough to interfere with learning
- Sore throat serious enough to interfere with swallowing or accompanied by fever or rash
- Undiagnosed rash
- Any bacterial infection until student has been on antibiotic therapy for 24 hours

Returning to School:

- Your child should be fever free (100 degrees or lower) for at least 24 hours without fever reducing medications.
- If your child has vomited or has diarrhea, we also recommend they stay home till they are 24 hours free without the use of medication.

Suggestions for Recovery:

- Encourage fluids as tolerated
- Encourage extra rest time, consider limiting their extracurricular activities for a couple of days.
- Reinforce the importance of hand washing.
- Wipe down hard surfaces with a disinfectant solution

TRY THIS AT HOME

Describing Being able to adequately describe an object permeates into many different educational areas including literacy, conversation and writing. Try these activities at your child's level:

- describe the characters in a story; how do they look? For children with higher level skills, how do they act, feel or behave?
- describe objects in your environment by function, "I'm thinking of something that keeps food cold and is in the kitchen..."
- pick one object and describe it in many different ways, "a frog is green, lives in the pond, hops around, eats flies & says ribbit.

BOOK NOOK

Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes by James Dean & Eric Litwin

This story can be sung as a song and is bound to become one of your child's favorites. Pete goes through his day stepping in lots of different things to turn his shoes many different colors. But he never cries, oh no! This story also teaches the concept of flexibility and rolling along no matter what happens.

FOCUS ON...EXPRESSION

Expressive language is what we orally verbalize. Language expression can be described by the content of what we say rather than how we say it (i.e. articulation). Expressive skills are often lagging behind comprehension skills in language development. Here are some ways to support and foster oral language growth.

Answering wh- questions is an extremely important expressive language skill. Questions words include, who, what, where, when, why and how. In order to answer a wh- question adequately, children first have to know what is being asked. If you're child is having trouble in this area focus on one question word at a time and explain to them the meaning (e.g. "who questions are for people). This is perfect for book reading.

Retelling a narrative can be a challenging skill. It requires memory, clear expression and organization skills. Try reading a favorite book, then going back and having your child describe the pages in order. What happened first, next, then and last?

Increasing sentence length is an important step to building expressive language. Modeling sentences just above your child's level is a good place to start. When you're child says, "blue car," try modeling, that's right, it's a BIG blue car."

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STRATEGY OF THE MONTH: SELF CUEING

A self cue is the highest form of prompt on the prompt hierarchy. This is when a child is able to remind him or herself of what is expected in certain situations. Here's a few ways to promote self-cuing.

Visuals or checklists—work great for morning or bedtime routine. This can list all the steps to be completed before bedtime can occur. Physically checking off items is also a good way to motivate your child.

Visual reminders—work well as cues for expected behaviors. For example, A picture of a child sitting quietly helps trigger the same action in your child.

District transportation is available upon request during registration






Students who are recommended will enroll for summer school between April 2 and April 4, 2024 A registration link will be emailed to those families on April 2nd at 7:00 a.m
